- 5. How personal and authentic is the writer's voice/style? Does it sound like him/her? Is it a real and honest portrayal? Does it sound too bland? Too phony? Too intellectual? Too informal? Do you feel like you know them? Do you like the writer? Are they bragging? Whining? Complaining? Seeking sympathy? Exaggerating? Do the essays want to make you want to read more?
- 6. Can you identify a theme in each essay? Is there a thread that runs through all three? Is any info. repeated in 3 essays?

Structure and Style:

- 7. Does the first sentence captivate the reader?
- 8. Does the introduction engage the reader?
- 9. Can you identify the thesis or theme of each essay? Is it just an excuse to list accomplishments?
- 10. Can you identify the topic sentence/purpose of each paragraph?
- 11. Does the writer use concrete details and experiences to support the topic sentence and focus?
- 12. How insightful and personal is the commentary? Do you feel what the writer is feeling and thinking then and now?
- 13. Any cliches, empty phrases, or sentences such as "Basically," The fact of the matter is," "It made me who I am today," "I learned a lot," or "It really helped/taught me," and "... to grow/mature/prepare me...."
- 14. How does it read? Does it flow? Does it seem like it takes forever to get through? Can any sentences be combined, shortened, eliminated? Every sentence is crucial. Any errors in grammar or mechanics?
- 15. Eliminate wordiness. Can it be said in fewer words? Is it full of fluff and padding? Think like a poet. Be concise and profound.
- 16. Active voice? How many verbs of being (is, are, was, were, etc) need to be eliminated? Any overused words? Is the language vibrant and colorful or bland and tired?
- 17. Does the sentence structure very throughout the essay? Openings? Length? Closings? Separate subject and verbs? Open with phrases and clauses? Start with ING form of the verb.
- 18. Can you identify transitions in the essay? Does it need some (logical, temporal, spatial, chronological)?
- 19. Does the conclusion avoid summary? Does it expand on broader implications of your discussion? Does it connect to opening in any way? End with a quote, metaphor, analogy, or reference?
- 20. Could the essay be organized in a better way? How?
